A free interactive exhibition, M4S reflects the scope of all industry activities: the 4 Ms stand for Mining, Minerals, Metals and Materials. Since 1997, the Foundation has supported Prospectors and Developers Association of Canada (PDAC) **Mining Matters**, a charitable

CMMF supports **MineralsEd** (formerly known as Mineral Resources Education Program of BC.). Founded in 1991, it

has benefited from CMMF's support since 2000. This year, MineralsEd is partnering with CMMF for the mineral card project.

They will receive eight mineral cards created specifically to help with their educational programs. These cards will also be integrated online into the CMMF mineral card project. They will be housed on both the CMMF and the MineralsEd websites.



This will provide schools in British Columbia with direct access to the cards through the MineralsEd website (www.mineralsed.ca), which will then direct them to the larger CMMF collection.

CMMF provides over \$90,000 a year in **scholarships** to attract undergraduate students to mining programs such as mining engineering and geology.

From time to time, CMMF also sponsors **special projects**, for example the presentation of the Diamond Exhibition in Halifax (2010), as well as other special initiatives that encourage members of the general public to better understand some of the many benefits of the mining industry.

CMMF'S SIGNATURE MINERAL CARD PROJECT

When CMMF first launched the mineral card project at CIM Edmonton 2012, the reception was extremely positive. There were many suggestions on how to enhance the 52-card project and make it grow into a national educational tool.

It quickly became obvious that the cards were more than information about minerals. The project not only had become a launch pad for promoting companies (the generous sponsors of the cards), but also a vehicle for promoting not-for-profit organizations such as science centres, museums, universities, mineral clubs, mineral education programs and others.

We contacted schools across the country where we had awarded scholarships and invited them to "adopt" a mineral and to use their school's web page to promote their mining and mining-related programs. We looked at partners that had contributed to the M4S mining education show across the country and offered them a "mineral" and page to promote their good work.

By opening the project to a broader base of partners and collaborators, we moved forward quickly and the website grew by leaps and bounds. Soon after, two government programs offered their support. Native groups were also approached and partnerships were forged with the view of making the cards available in their local syllabics. Special minerals were requested from different areas of the country depending on their curriculum, and we were delighted to provide the appropriate cards for them.

By keeping the project general in nature, the cards can be adapted to almost any educational environment. The basic information is on the card – it is used as a key to stimulate interest in searching for more mineral cards.

The mineral card project has become a pivotal project for promoting the industry, education and some national collections. Key cards are housed on many websites across Canada, enticing avid young minds to visit local sites and then gravitate to the CMMF national site.

The growing request for cards became overwhelming. We then devised an easy template for visitors to choose, download and print their favourite photos onto a standard glossy postcard paper which is available at Staples and Bureau en Gros, (item no. 490861).

Sets of mineral cards are distributed free of charge to educators who attend select conferences and tradeshows. Corporate sponsors also distribute cards to their network of designated recipients. CMMF continues to post cards on their website to ensure that the project grows.

These cards continue to be offered, free of charge, to all educators who attend mining and mining-related conferences, including the M4S educational show.

To date, many companies have graciously sponsored a mineral, providing the funds required for the distribution of these cards.

CMMF scholars lead the way with the Scotiabank Scholarship

The Canadian Mining and Metallurgical Foundation (CMMF) is committed to ensuring a strong future for the mining industry by supporting and promoting education. In an effort to encourage students to pursue careers in mining and related industries, CMMF offers the Scotiabank Scholarship.

The Scotiabank Scholarship was established in 1998 on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of CIM. Each year, a \$2,000 scholarship is awarded to a student completing an undergraduate degree in the field of exploration and/or geology in Canada. Candidates are judged on academic achievement and their commitment to a career in the mining, minerals or energy industries.

The following scholarship recipients continue to make outstanding contributions to the mining industry.



Alexandre Boucher

Alexandre Boucher, PhD Scholarship recipient, 1998

Scotiabank After receiving the scholarship in 1998, Alexandre Boucher developed an interest in computational and quantitative geology. He was introduced to the field of geostatistics École through his courses at Polytechnique de Montreal, an interest that was solidified during internships at Inco in Sudbury, Ontario. In 2001, he

moved to Australia to pursue a master's degree at the University of Queensland under Professor Roussos Dimitrakopoulos. He completed his studies in geostatistics, obtaining a PhD at Stanford University in 2007 under the direction of Professor André Journel. After graduation, he remained at Stanford for three years as acting assistant professor.

While studying, teaching and conducting research at Stanford, Dr. Boucher became involved in the development of the Stanford Geostatistical Modeling Software (SGeMS) and co-authored the book Applied Geostatistics with SGeMS, published by Cambridge University Press. To date, SGeMS has been downloaded more than 50,000 times and is used both in the mining and energy industries for resource modeling and quantification.

In 2010, Dr. Boucher founded the company Advanced Resources and Risk Technology, LLC (AR2Tech) where he provides consulting and software development to the mining industry, as well as continues the development of SGeMS. To this day, he still proudly references the CIM scholarship on his resume. Dr. Boucher currently resides in Sunnyvale, California, and is a consulting professor in the energy resources engineering department at Stanford University.



Joshua Bailey

Joshua Bailey, M.Sc., P.Geo. Scholarship recipient, 2000

Joshua Bailey began his career in 1998 with a prospecting course offered by the Yukon Chamber of Mines. He holds a M.Sc. degree from Laurentian University in Sudbury, Ontario, and a B.Sc. degree from Memorial University in St. John's, Newfoundland. He was the recipient of the Scotiabank Scholarship in 2000 and during his studies was also awarded the Dean of Science Medallion for Academic Excellence and an award for Excellence in Geoscience.

Mr. Bailey is currently vice-president of exploration for Wallbridge Mining Company Limited, previously holding successive roles in the company since 2004. He is responsible for projects exploring for platinum, palladium, nickel, copper and gold near Sudbury, Ontario. His work includes managing mineral exploration joint ventures with Impala Platinum Holdings Limited, Lonmin Plc and Xstrata Nickel. He has also conducted exploration in Yukon Territory, British Columbia, Newfoundland and Labrador, and throughout Ontario.

Mr. Bailey is a passionate vocal supporter of Canada's mining industry and its importance to our society. He is president of the Sudbury Prospectors and Developers Association, through which he has organized a number of introductory community prospecting workshops. He is also a director of the Ontario Prospectors Association and Ontario Exploration Corporation.



Margaret Harder

Margaret Harder, M.Sc., P.Geo. Scholarship recipient, 2001

Margaret Harder graduated from the University of Saskatchewan in 2002 with a degree in geology and obtained her master's in geology from the University of British Columbia in 2004. She was awarded the 2002 University of Saskatchewan Ore Gangue Memorial Award for academic excellence, as well as the Geological Association of Canada Léopold Gélinas Silver Medal in 2005 for the most outstanding master's thesis in the field of volcanology and igneous petrology.

During her career in the mining sector, Ms.

Harder has had the opportunity to work at numerous companies. Her first position was at Cameco Corp as a geological assistant. Following completion of her master's thesis, she began working with Peregrine Diamonds Ltd. as a project geologist. Advancing in her career, she became project geoscientist at Mineral Services Canada. Ms. Harder is currently a geologist at Tetra Tech Wardrop, where her role includes geological modeling, technical report writing and mineral resource estimation. She is the 2001 recipient of the Scotiabank Scholarship.
